# COACH JEREMY FRASER'S UPDATE

Princeton Sailing experienced another year of phenomenal growth and development that helped drive the team to its **highest Co-Ed national ranking in two decades – 37th**.

The Spring season's success can be attributed to 3 defining qualities universally found in the current roster of Princeton Sailors—Determination, Consistency, and Composure. It is no secret to the college sailing world that Princeton Sailors are determined to compete at the highest level and will take any and every opportunity to do so. The spring started at the University of Hawai'i for a Grade 3 PCCSC Co-Ed Fleet race where the Tigers placed 3rd out of 18 teams, marking the first podium finish in an 18-boat fleet for the program in nearly a decade. This result would start the competitive fire that kept our sailors warm through the winter months of training. February 20th marked the first day of practice at Anchor Yacht Club as the Tigers prepared themselves for the Spring 2023 regatta schedule. Fair-weather sailors are scarcely found at Princeton; the vast majority of team members would make a minimum of 2 practices a week this past semester.

This culture of consistency at practice helped our program find consistency in competition, and the fact that we found consistency at the top of the score sheet can be attributed to how extraordinary this group of Tiger Sailors is. The team's hardest test of composure came at the end of the season when we were left at home for the 2023 college Co-Ed Fleet Racing National Championships, despite beating teams that were selected 28th, 29th, 33rd, 34th, and 36th when faced head to head, along with finishing 12th overall at the Spring Season Conference Championship. After leaving it all out on the water, and although a tough defeat for our graduating seniors, this team left campus for the summer with their heads held high and the sights set on next year's competitive season as they look forward to a quadruple header the first weekend of the 2023 Fall Season.

To close, the culture of the Princeton Sailing Team has never been in a better place, flourishing because of the team's diversity. This group of students has come together from all backgrounds, programs, and prior sailing experiences to accomplish one goal: seeing Princeton Sailing compete in the College Sailing National Championships.





# FAREWELL TO OUR SENIORS







# SPRING 2023 SEASON IN REVIEW

## Preseason - Jan. 14–15

Princeton Sailing wasted no time getting on the water in the new year, traveling to Hawai'i to compete in the Peter Wenner Memorial Fleet Race in a fleet of 18 teams from the West Coast. Sailors **Connor Mraz '23** and **Anna Eaton '24** started the day with a 1-3-1 as sailors **Asher Green '24** and **Nelson Chow '23** settled into some mid-fleet finishes. A steady start for the Princeton Tigers placed the team in 5th place overall after day one.



Day two brought tricky conditions for the Tigers as they looked forward to their fellow East Coast Competitors at Salve Regina. Back-and-forth racing throughout the day made for a lot of fluctuation on the scoring sheet, but the Tigers would remain consistent and best Salve Regina in the final set of the regatta to claim 3rd place overall. This would mark Princeton Sailings' best finish in an 18-boat fleet since 2010.

## Preseason - Feb. 10–12

The Tigers competed in the Southern Collegiate Offshore Regatta. Battling multiple weather fronts that brought winds upwards of 30 knots, the team took home 2nd in their PHRF division, with 13 points to the University of South Carolina's 12.



## Week 2 - Feb. 25–26

Princeton Sailing traveled to St. Petersburg, FL to compete against 9 teams from the SAISA conference. **Connor Mraz '23** and **Anna Eaton '24** were steady as they posted scores consistently in the top 5 until they caught fire in the 7th race finishing the day 1-1-4-3 and putting the Tigers in 4th place after day 1. Sunday brought very similar conditions, a light southerly to start the morning and the sea breeze filling in around noon. Tigers **Asher Green '24** and **Isabella Impalli '23** were ready to pounce. Catching their competitors early in the day helped bring Princeton Sailing to a 3rd place overall finish and its 3rd consecutive podium finish in the 2023 Spring Season.



## Week 3 - Mar. 4–5



Princeton Sailing traveled to Washington College in Chestertown, MD to compete in the Tom Noble Team Race. This weekend was highlighted by Princeton's first Team Race wins over the US Naval Academy and St. Mary's in Program History. A hard-fought weekend brought the team to a 4th-place finish overall, leaving the Tigers hungry to return to Washington College on March 18th-19th to compete in the WAC Team Race.

## Week 4 - Mar. 10–12

Princeton Sailing also traveled to Harvard to compete in a team race against 9 NEISA conference competitors. The Tigers were challenged in the first race going up against the number-one-ranked Harvard, who has yet to lose a team race this season. A fantastic start against MIT brought us to mark one in a winning combination 1-3-6 with sailors **Connor Mraz '23** and **Berkely Yiu '25** leading the pack to the turn at mark 2. A great mark trap from the MIT Engineers at mark 3 passed our 3rd place boat into the 4th position leaving us some ground to make up on the final upwind leg. Freshmen **Ossian Kamal '26** and **Skylor Wong '26** broke free to the left around mark 4 and found pressure and a port tack lift that launched them back into the front of the fleet giving the Tigers a 1-3-6 victory. The Tigers took down the varsity program Roger Williams Hawks in a 1-4-5 combination in the second race of the day finishing off the event with a 2/12 record.



## Week 5 - Mar. 18–19



A strong week of preparation during spring break put Tiger Sailors on the right foot as they traveled to Chestertown, MD to compete in the Washington College Team Race. Back on familiar waters, the tigers posted a 10-4 record leaving the day tied for second place against the Naval Academy Midshipmen. Posting a 1-1 record against varsity Competitors Navy and St. Marys would leave it all to be decided in the third round. Sailors **Asher Green '24** and **Virginia Cobbs '25** lead our Tiger Sailors to a dominating 1-2-5 finish over the St. Mary's Seahawks securing our place on the podium for the 4th time this spring.

## Week 6 - Mar. 25–26

Princeton Sailing traveled to Newport News, Virginia to compete in the Hanbury Trophy against 14 teams from both MAISA and SAISA conferences. With 4 races left to go, the Princeton Tigers trailed the North Carolina State Wolfpack by 3 points. After a nailbiting first set, the Tigers would fall back to trail by 7, a surmountable margin with 2 races left in the regatta. But after clutch performances from **Mraz '23**, **Feiner '26**, **Green '24**, and **Cobbs '25**, the Princeton Tigers would claim victory in the last moments of the regatta, defeating North Carolina State by 16 points!



## Week 7 - Apr. 1–2

Princeton Sailing hosted 8 schools at our home venue Anchor Yacht Club for a fleet racing regatta this past weekend. Saturday had no shortage of highlights. The one that trumped them all came from **Bracklinn Williams '25** and **Lucas Chen '26** in the final race of day one in the B fleet. After a starting position that would be better off forgotten, Bracklinn and Lucas would climb their way back to claim a bullet in the final race of the day capping off a fantastic day with an unforgettable finish. After completing 5 races for each fleet Princeton Sailing would finish atop the results table followed by Washington College, and Columbia. At the same time, Princeton Sailors **Connor Mraz '23**, **Kate Feiner '26**, **Ossian Kamal '26**, and **Skylor Wong '26** traveled to New London, Connecticut to compete in a grade 3 NEISA conference fleet race. Princeton Sailors would struggle to find a consistent beat on day 1 but after an hour-long discussion with Coach Fraser analyzing the day and race course, they felt confident and ready for day 2. All in all, a fantastic weekend for Princeton Sailing with 10 of our top 13 pairings hitting the water for competition in one weekend -- a true testament to the depth of our roster.



## Week 8 - Apr. 8–9

Princeton Sailing traveled to the beautiful Toms River Yacht Club to compete in the Ocean County Spring Open against a field of MAISA club and varsity competitors. The Tigers finished off the regatta strong with 5 races in A and B fleet to make for a 14-race regatta. A well-run event at a beautiful venue has the Tigers eager to return in Spring 2024.



## Week 9 - Apr. 15–16

Princeton Sailing traveled to Port Jefferson, New York to compete in the Grant Trophy. An up-and-down start for the A boat would leave us with an 8-point deficit to make up in the final 2 races. A 3rd place in race 1 would set the stage for a winner take all final race of the regatta giving the coaches, competitors, and spectators everything they could ask for in a college sailing regatta! A clean start from all would make for an exhilarating first beat as boats jockeyed back and forth to keep their lanes clean and protect the favored left-hand side of the race course. Princeton Sailing would round mark 1 first, closely followed by the entire fleet stacking up behind them. With the regatta on the line **Virginia Cobbs '25** made the tactical call of the weekend to separate from the fleet and dig into the left corner of the race course, launching her boat  $\frac{1}{3}$  of a leg ahead of their competitors and securing a comfortable lead around mark 3. A steady downwind would cap off the regatta with a convincing bullet in race 8b, capping off a great regatta, and securing Princeton Sailing's 3rd win of the spring season.

## Week 10 - Apr. 21–23

Princeton Sailing traveled to MIT to compete in the 85th BDC trophy, the longest-standing regatta in college sailing. A strong start for A division sailors **Connor Mraz '23** and **Kate Feiner '26** posting a 2, 7 in the first set of the regatta. The highlight race for Freshman sailors **Ossian Kamal '26** and **Skylor Wong '26** came in race 9, where they would finish 3rd,



proving to themselves and others that Princeton Sailing will be here to compete at the top level for the foreseeable future. Princeton Sailing finished 16th in its first-ever BDC and is looking forward to climbing the results table next year. Princeton Sailing also competed in the George E. Morris Trophy, hosted by Boston University, with **Will Roberts '26** and **Calif Chen '23** in the A Division, and **Eddie O'Keefe '25** and **Isabel Kim '24** in the B Division. This regatta was a great opportunity for Princeton Sailors to see how the level of racing differs in the NEISA Conference. Congratulations to **Robert Rubin '23** and **Calif Chen '23** for sailing their last set of college sailing together in the 13th and 14th races in A Division, capping off a fantastic college sailing career together.




The Princeton Sailing Women's Team competed in the MAISA Women's Fleet Racing Championships against 13 other schools at St Mary's College of Maryland. The highlight of day 1 came from the A fleet boat in race 1 sailed by **Bracklinn Williams '25** and **Katie Greppin '26**. Bracklinn and Katie led boats to the right side after a late boat start positioning themselves well for a starboard tack lift on the race's first leg, getting their boat around mark 1 in 6th position! They would lose a few boats on the downwind finishing the first race of the regatta with a 9th place. Sunday brought a 5-6 knot WNW breeze that would give the Race Committee just enough time

to finish 14 races and finish out the regatta with a full rotation. The Highlights on day two were made by **Evelyn Walsh '26** and **Cora LeCates '26** with an aggressive start routine had them beating top teams from Cornell, Georgetown, and Penn off the line.



Princeton Sailing also competed in the MAISA Co-Ed Fleet Racing Championships against the top 18 teams in the MAISA Conference this past weekend. Breeze on Saturday was in and out as Race Committee and Sailors waited patiently for the best opportunity to get races off. A long hot day was finished with a stable 6 knot North-Westerly that was used to complete 7 races for both A and B divisions. Princeton Sailing was sitting in 9th place overall after day 1. On Sunday, an 8-12 knot South-Easterly breeze filled in immediately upon arrival at the ODU Sailing Center. Princeton Sailors **Asher Green '24** and **Virginia Cobbs '25** fought hard in the B division posting a final set of 3 and 6. Congratulations to Senior and A division Skipper **Connor Mraz '23** for completing his last Conference Championship, and Freshman Crew **Kate Feiner '26** for competing in her first! Princeton Sailing finished 12th overall marking Princeton Sailings' highest finish in the modern college sailing era. Historically there has been a large scoring gap between the 12th and 13th teams in the MAISA Conference, and this regatta marks the date when Princeton Sailing closed that gap, kicking USMMA at Kings Point into the 13th rank for Co-Ed Fleet Racing.






# FROM ALUMNI & ARCHIVES

Arthur Knapp, Jr. '28, who founded the Princeton sailing team in 1928, was still active with the team during my years at Princeton from 1956-1960. He lived in Westchester County, just outside New York City, and he often came down to campus to give an evening talk to the team.

However, by far his most significant contribution to sailing at Princeton was this: He bought an Interclub (IC) Dinghy for our team and made it available to any Princeton sailors willing to drive up to the Larchmont Yacht Club on a Sunday between November and March to sail in the weekly frostbite races. Arthur named 'our' IC 'Tiger' and her hull was painted black with an orange waterline. Each Sunday a fleet of between 35 and 50 ICs sailed as many short races as could be fit in between midday and twilight. The fleet was incredibly competitive. It included many famous names from the America's Cup and from the top rank of the many one-design fleets that raced on Long Island Sound in the summers. Sailing Tiger was like sailing a grand piano – she was beautiful – made of molded plywood, her interior was impeccably varnished. Arthur equipped her with exactly the same gear he used for his own IC (#8, named 'Agony'). When Agony got a new sail, so did Tiger. There was a 250 or 275 pound minimum weight limit on the skipper and crew. Arthur was a big guy. He easily weighed 220 or more, and so his crew was usually a child who had only recently graduated from being a babe in arms. Neither wet suits nor dry suits were used in those days. Arthur's crew looked like the 'Michelin Child' swaddled in many layers of warm clothes, topped off with a life jacket and a wool hat. Arthur had little need for a crew. He did pretty much everything in the boat; his crew often was often seen just wandering aimlessly about forward of Agony's thwart.

The greatest benefit for Princeton sailors was that, in the short intervals between races, Arthur would 'coach' us – in his own inimitable way. The three-minute auditory starting signals were used, and there wasn't any wasted time between races. Arthur's number one goal was to be in position to win the next start – so he only had a very short time to 'coach' us. He would sail up to us, with his Sherlock Holmes style pipe clenched between his teeth, puffing away and give us a very few seconds of incredibly good advice. Here's a sample of what's left in my memory of a typical coaching session. Arthur: "You damned fools – you started at the wrong end -- your outhaul's too loose -- sit further forward -- bunch your weight." All of this delivered in about 10 seconds and then, before there had been any time for us to respond, he'd have sailed off. But we soon learned that, if we started the next race at the other end of the line; tightened our outhaul, sat further forward, and bunched our weight, we would almost invariably finish a little higher up in the fleet in the next race. As a result of Arthur's coaching and his book, *Race Your Boat Right*, I became a far better sailor.

I have some more Arthur stories that I'll save for a future newsletter. In the meantime, please send us your favorite memories of sailing during your Princeton years.


